LOCAL HAMS ON NATIONAL NEWS!

Agawam HS debuts a 'pothole finding robot' !

Did you know a few members of VCDX have been instrumental in the design of a robot to search & destroy potholes? Andy, KB1FVL and Erik, KB1FSU, members of HCRA, VCDX and the Agawam HS robotics club have participated in just that—a pothole finding robot. Here's a brief excerpt from one of the newspaper reports:

The Agawam High School Robotics Club devised the pothole predictor. Using money from an Massachusetts Institute of Technology grant they created a machine that can find hollow places under pavement, drill in and fill them. In other words, stop potholes before they form. The students are testing it now on a strip of road outside the school and they may try it on city streets next month.

"We want to give the students a taste of the modern corporate world. We are investigating all options. We are working on patents and stuff like that. We will see if we can sell them," said student Kristopher Kelly. "I did not expect to get this far, and shame on me for doubting us, because we did a great job."

The students made the news in many ways including the Boston Globe and an interview on Channel 5. I don't know if amateur radio played a part in the design of the robot but I'll bet somewhere along the line it did. Isn't it nice to see our young people inventing neat stuff?

Congratulations to Andy, Erik and the rest of the Agawam robotics team, I hope you're successful.

NEXT UP—ARRL 10M CONTEST

Can we beat last year's score?

Are you ready for another club contest? The ARRL 10M contest starts December 10 at 7:00 PM and ends December 12 at 7:00 PM. This is one of those contests that has a little for everyone. If the band is open it's a good way to work some new DX, you won't be up all night because there isn't much happening when the band closes down after sunset and you get to claim your personal score plus submit it for an HCRA club score too. Pretty neat, huh?

HCRA has done quite well in previous years. In 2002 we claimed over 925,000 points with 11 members participating. Last year was not as good, fewer participants and the band didn't cooperate. Still we ended up with over 200K points, not bad for a dead band!

Since last year quite a few new hams have come on board in the club. Anyone with a Technician Plus license or above can operate this HF contest. It's a fun 'test, doesn't require long hours and if the band is open doesn't require a lot of power either. A great way to get your feet wet in both HF operation and contesting. And... snag some new DX at the same time.

Last year we had six entrants for HCRA. Do you think we can do better this year? All you have to do is get on and operate. When you send in your log simply identify your club affiliation as "Hampden County Radio Assn" and both you and the club get the credit. We can discuss it further at the holiday party this week. ZeroBeats from the Past

Note! The following is a reprint from an older issue of ZeroBeat dated September 1990. The original article, of course, is much older. The Time I Met HPM

(At my request, Percy wrote this letter. This was originally printed in the June 1979 issue of Zero Beat. As I read old, and I mean OLD QST's, there was my friend W1BVR listed for traffic handling while he was away at college. W1KK was also listed, but that was Hank Baier or Tom Chapman, not Art Zavarella. There's a story there, but you'll have to wait to hear it. Jeff - K1BE)

Here's Percy's letter:

Dear Zero Beat,

I had the pleasure at the Springfield ARRL convention in 1935 of introducing Hiram Percy Maxim to the group there. I talked with him for quite a few minutes. That was during my very first term as Western Massachusetts SCM. He radiated enthusiasm and knowledge. That was one of the highlights of my radio experiences!

You may not know this: HPM, (then ARRL President) died in February of 1936. The League Vice-president, Mr. Stewart, died at about the same time. Dr. Woodruff, of the University of Pennsylvania, became the ARRL President. George Bailey, W1KH, our New England Director, became ARRL Vice-president. Hence, an election in New England for ARRL director. The result of that election: W1BVR (209); W1EAO (182); W1ASI (140); W1LFI (109); W1CAB (60); W1EPH (34); W1BSJ (22). That was the start of my 18 years as N.E. Director! So many moons ago!

Percy was a League official for many, many years. I had the pleasure of calling him my friend and I am still inspired by his sterling example today. I regard his passing as a loss to all that is good in amateur radio.

Ham Radio Demo for Pack 207, Easthampton de Luke, KB1ISP

On Thursday November 21 Steve (KB1GHC), his father, and I arrived at the Easthampton Episcopal Society Parish Office after a short drive around to find the building. We quickly unloaded our equipment and entered into the room where about 80 people (mostly scouts) were getting ready for a meeting. As we walked in with our armloads of cables and boxes we were greeted by many curious stares. I was told by someone who seemed to know who we were to go to the front of the room and talk with Dave Bernier the CM for Pack 207. I spoke with Dave and he asked me if we could be ready for 7:30 and I assured him it would be enough time. I asked him a little concerned where the best place to set up a 100 foot long antenna would be and he told me that the backyard would probably have enough space.



Steve and I quickly got to work setting up our G5RV in the small playground outback. At first we thought that two trees that were opposite one another in the yard would do the trick but the twine ended up getting tangled in a maple tree with our baseball attached and we had to cut our losses and the twine with a leatherman. We then came up with an alternate configuration that involved securing the center of the dipole on the small play structure while using a metal pole and a hemlock tree to secure the legs. The long wires angled back toward the building and the feedline ran over the yard to the back door. We had set up a workable dipole in an arrow configuration that we felt would serve the purpose of a few quick QSO's with some of the scouts.

As we returned inside we set up our rig and Astron power supply on a small table close to the back door. Soon Brian(KB1IGM) and Jeff(Nx1x) arrived. I attached the coax connector feeling confident in our work. However it soon became clear that we were receiving no signals on any HF bands. We thought it might be the tuning but after trying 40, 80, 20 and 15 meters we were still unable to come up with a contact. Soon came time to present.

As we stood in the corner listening to the meeting coming to an end I was asked by Brian if he should make the introduction and I said sure. Soon Brian was up in front and called all 3 of us up with our titles and introduced the crew. I started off by introducing our hobby as a means of communication and recreation that people all over the world could enjoy. I directed attention to the rig and I explained the different functions and told about how it was set up. Meanwhile Steve and Jeff were wrestling with the radio to try and make some kind of contact but to no avail. I tried to make it interesting by telling them that we have talked to many different countries all over the world and to people who are right near by who are friends and acquaintances. The kids seemed to be very engaged and every few seconds a hand would come up with a question and soon Brian and I were both fielding questions. The presentation wrapped up with a couple of VHF repeater contacts on the Crew's dual band HT. We were able to get about 4 kids on the air to talk with Jim(KK1W) and Steve (N1SR) many thanks to both. We were not able to do HF but we got at least the very interested involved. We later found that a poorly soldered PL-259 connector to the ladder line had come undone and left us with no connection.

THE SOUNDS OF OUR HOBBY... ANNOUNCING THE 2005 ARRL STRAIGHT KEY NIGHT

Let's journey back to years gone by when an aspiring young amateur was being coaxed by his Elmer to "go ahead, put your hand on the key and try sending a few letters." As the youngster gathered his courage, he gets the feel of the key. "You don't literally have to 'pound' brass to send code" the Elmer admonishes after the death grip the kid has on the keyer nearly forces it through the desktop. "Relax, take it easy. You know the letters in your mind. Now, let your fist transfer the characters to the key."

With a little practice the kid is finally ready to try a QSO on the air, under the watchful tutelage of the faithful Elmer. With a "cheat sheet" in hand -- the text of what the young operator will send carefully written out -- the painfully slow first letters -- "C" "Q" are transmitted. The side tone of the radio mesmerizes the new operator as he realizes "WOW... I just sent my first CQ...." And the kid was hooked...

We tap the code out in our licensing classes as we learn "dits and dahs." While sitting in traffic, we translate the words on billboards or the letters on license plates into Morse. The short and long sounds become easy to distinguish at slower speeds, with some practice. As we gain some confidence in our skill to copy, we speed up. And the music of the key becomes our anthem. We tune across the bottom 50 KHz or so of any of our HF bands. Like the rhythmic cadence of drums in the distance, the almost ominous sound of a weak CW signal beckons those that love "the code".



In this era of digital communication, keyboarding, FM and electronic keys, once a year many excellent operators bring the past to the present and participate in the annual **ARRL Straight Key Night**. The object of this friendly event is to enjoy some good, old fashioned QSO fun, using straight keys. The emphasis is on rag-chewing rather than fast contest-type exchanges. **SKN 2005** begins at 7:00 p.m. EST December 31 and runs for 24 hours through 7:00 p.m. EST January 1 (**0000 --2400 UTC January 1, 2005**).

In many circles **SKN** has been expanded to encompass vintage radio equipment as well. Reminiscing about their early days in our hobby, many operators use **SKN** as the "excuse" to refurbish their old Viking, Heathkit, or Scout. You will hear as many vintage radios on the air during **SKN** as you will variety of keys. And you will hear signals generated using old-fashioned bugs, a variation of the straight key. **SKN** is the time amateur radio recalls the past, transporting it to the present.

When participating in **SKN 2005**, instead of sending RST before sending the signal report send the letters **SKN**, to indicate your participation, and to clue in passers-by who may be listening that **SKN** is going strong. After **SKN**, send the Contest Branch a list of stations worked, plus your vote for the best fist you heard (it doesn't have to be one you worked). Also, include your vote for the most interesting QSO you had or monitored.

Don't forget to post your comments and interesting photographs from your **SKN** adventure to the **ARRL Contest Online Soapbox** at www.arrl.org/contests/soapbox Entries should be emailed to the Contest Branch at StraightKey@arrl.org or may be sent via regular mail to SKN, ARRL, 225 Main St, Newington, CT 06111. The Soapbox becomes an on-line album of stores and photographs to share with others.

Entries for **SKN 2005** must be received by January 31, 2005. Votes for 'Best Fist' and "Most Interesting QSO" will be tabulated and included in the April 2005 issue of *QST*.
