


IRLP is On-the-Air!

IRLP node #727 is now operational. Hams in the Pioneer Valley can now talk "around the world" with a 2 meter transceiver. John got the node running a few weeks ago, and many have made memorable contacts since. It's easy and fun. Just dial up 146.46 MHz on your 2 meter rig, (don't forget the 114.8 PL) and listen. If you don't hear any activity you have a couple of choices. Either link one of the popular reflectors (reflectors are like repeaters) or look up a node on the list. After linking, listen again. If you don't hear anyone, try asking if anyone is listening. You never know what you will find!

To link the Raleigh, NC reflector simply announce your intention to link and press **9210** on your keypad. Have fun and when you're done simply press **9211** to disconnect the node (You've probably guessed it by now, **921** is the node number and **0** connects, **1** disconnects) Pretty simple once you try it a few times.

Additionally, there will be a short seminar on how to link and use the IRLP node at this month's meeting. Bring your questions with you on Friday and learn all about IRLP.



Since the node is located in South Hadley it's best used either from home or within a 5 - 10 mile radius around the station. Plans are in the works to improve the antenna, both gain and height, in the near future. If you have any questions, need help or want to assist with the project give either John (Kx1x) or myself (KK1W) a call. This node is a credit to HCRA. Member donations of both time and money got it on the air in a few short months. Use it and enjoy it. It's open to everyone, members and non-members alike, so pass the word.

SKYWARN Lightning Safety Tips



1. **Plan in advance your evacuation and safety measures. When you first see lightning or hear thunder, go to a building or a vehicle. Lightning often precedes rain, so don't wait for the rain to begin before suspending activities.**
2. **IF OUTDOORS... Avoid water. Avoid the high ground. Avoid open spaces. Avoid all metal objects including electric wires, fences, machinery, motors power tools, etc. Unsafe places include underneath canopies, small picnic or rain shelters, or near trees. When possible, find shelter in a substantial building or in a fully enclosed metal vehicle such as a car, truck, or a van with windows completely shut. If lightning is striking nearby when you are outside, you should :
A: Crouch down. Put feet together. Place hands over ears to minimize hearing damage from thunder.
B: Avoid proximity (minimum of 15ft.) to other people.**
3. **IF INDOORS... Avoid water. Stay away from doors and windows. Do not use the telephone. Take off head sets. Turn off, unplug, and stay away from appliances, computers, power tools, & TV sets. Lightning may strike exterior electric and phone lines, inducing shocks to inside equipment.**
4. **SUSPEND ACTIVITIES for 30 minutes after the last observed lightning or thunder.**
5. **INJURED PERSONS do not carry an electric charge and can be handled safely. Apply First Aid procedures to a lightning victim if you are qualified to do so. Call 911 or send for help immediately.**

My First Dayton Hamvention

It all started last September (2001), while sitting at BB's (Brown Baggers), Jim – KK1W was talking about returning to the Dayton Hamvention in 2002. I mentioned that Dayton was something I would like to experience as I've never had the chance to go. Irv – W6IS also stated that he would like to go someday, too. While we chatted over things that go on at Dayton, Jim suggested that we make it a small group and drive up together.

I mentioned the idea to my wife Faye. We discussed it and she had no problems with me joining Irv and Jim for the Dayton 2002 adventure. I couldn't wait for May 2002. Only eight months to go!

Sometime in late December or early January, we started talking about where we would stay. Jim had mentioned that he stayed about 40 minutes outside of Dayton in a very small motel. I figured if I started looking now, I could find a hotel much closer and much more convenient. I started searching the Internet for Dayton hotels. Every hotel I checked was already booked up completely. How could this be? The convention was still 5 months away. I was told that most people that go every year made their reservations for the next year within 30 days of the existing years conventions. Unless I knew someone who was going or someone who usually went and was not returning or someone who died and would not need their hotel room, the chances of finding a free room was unlikely. Well, I kept searching for about 3 weeks and finally found a room at a Marriott and reserved it right away. The hotel was only 6½ miles from the Hara Arena.

We soon found a fourth member for our group. Dave – AA1YW was joining us and there was the possibility of his son; John – KB1FTX also. One hotel room was not going to be big enough. I called the hotel and luckily someone had just canceled, so I reserved a second room. I made sure my credit card was on both so that the rooms could not be given away.

Thursday, May 16th came. It was my wife's birthday and she was a little disappointed that I was leaving but she understood my excitement. I picked up Irv at 6:30 am and went to Dave's house for the planned 7 am start of the trip. After packing the car and resetting the trip odometer, we were off. We got onto the Mass pike at 7:30 am. The five of us were comfortably packed into Dave's big Ford Expedition. We were off.

Along the way, we tried all the IRLP nodes that Jim had written down. We kept linking back to the HCRA node (#727) to report our progress. Unfortunately it took us nearly 500 miles to figure out how to turn on the DTMF tones on the rig. We also learned how to make Dave's radio do other things. Nothing like a trip to force you to learn how to operate your own radio!

We pulled into the hotel at 10:30 pm. Exactly 15 hours and 761 miles after leaving home. Wow, long trip. We were tired and wired, ready for Friday.

Friday, May 17th: After battling the convention traffic, we finally were delivered to the Hara Arena. We soon learned that the inside vendors covered 5 full rooms and the outside vendors numbered around 2500 at the flea market. Since it was cold and raw, I decided to start inside. Upon entering the main arena (the size of the civic center floor) and looking around I knew I was in for a treat. While it was only morning of the first day, people were lined up eight people deep at the HRO and AES purchasing booths. People were already walking around with new purchases. My big question was do I buy today or wait for Saturday or Sunday? I was mainly interested in the Yaesu FT-817 and more.

I started through the show. Looking at the new goodies from Kenwood, Icom and Yaesu. Talking to the manufacturers. Looking at the toys. I tried to stop at every booth and see what they offered. The 817 was priced anywhere from \$565 to \$699. No great deals on that, so I waited and continued on. It seemed like all the ads from QST and other ham magazines had come to life. Manufacturers, small one-person companies and large resellers were there. Plus, all sorts of groups and stuff I had never seen before. And, lots and lots of people. It was very crowded.

After spending nearly 6 hours walking the floor, the price on the 817 had dropped to \$499. I started my purchasing frenzy. I didn't think it could drop any further and took my chances with the current price. A few friends had given me their wish list and they go ahead to purchase for them if the price was right. I stopped at HRO and found Chuck (who spoke at our last meeting) and started purchasing. Fifteen hundred dollars later it was on to another booth. W4RT makes some great 817 upgrades and add-ons. Another \$600 dropped there. Now loaded with too many bags and not enough arms it was time to find some help. Dave and John appeared and we made the return trip to the truck, stored the goodies inside and returned to the convention.

After wandering around some more, someone called my name. Unbelievable. From all 30,000 or so people Norm – W1BMK and Betty – KB1CPZ had found me. We chatted for a while and made plans to meet them for dinner tonight.

I regrouped with my group and we made our way to the truck and back to the hotel to meet with Norm and Betty. Like all the other visiting hams in the area, we needed to eat and rest. We found a nice restaurant called Max and Erma's. The food was delicious. It replenished our exhausted bodies. We excitedly talked about the show. We made plans on some things to buy tomorrow and the need to relax tonight. We hoped that the cold rain and 45 degree weather would be better for the rest of the weekend.

After returning to the hotel, Dave, John and I met at the pool area and soaked away our tired bodies in the hot tub and pool. It was a relaxing way to wind down the day. Upon returning to my room, I think I was sleeping before my head hit the pillow.

Saturday, May 18th: I joined the guys and walked around the flea market. It was about 48 degrees and windy. It was cold walking around. Where was the warm May weather? It was huge. Our common comments were that the junk has been at prior flea's and we've seen it before. But there were some neat things and some deals to be made. To our best guesstimate, we walked 3 to 5 miles up and down the rows at the flea. It seemed endless and it is very hard to say that we saw every vendor. I spent about 6 hours walking the flea market before I decided that I had seen enough. But there was some good stuff. For example, Dave bought a 25-amp power supply for \$35. We all had little goodies to add to our collection.

Saturday night we decided to eat Italian. Jim found what looked like a good place and we went out and enjoyed a good hearty meal. Then back to the hotel to play with our goodies. We set up John's 817, the MP-1 antenna, and his new paddles for cw and went searching for our first contact with the new rig. The MP-1 Super Antenna was clamped to the metal railing of the hotel. We were receiving good and decided to answer a CQ. It was a ham in Fort Smith, Arkansas. I made the qso and was amazed that the little qrp rig worked so well. We made the contact with only 2½ watts of power. I let John play with his radio (mine was still in its box). He made a cw contact with an HA4 in Hungary.

Sunday, May 19th: After sleeping a bit later and finding a decent place for breakfast (the hotel food was terrible and very overpriced), we worked our way to the show. We decided to park at the Salem Mall as we had on Friday and take the shuttle bus. We split up and wandered the show. I picked up some goodies inside, just as the vendors were starting to take their booths down. The 2002 Dayton Hamvention closed at 1 pm.

I found Dave, Jim, John and Irv. After finding the car we made our way to the Wright Patterson Air Force Museum. It too was huge. We learned about the first airplanes, manned flight, the wars, and everything having to do with flight. There were airplanes on the ground and in the air for display. It was obvious that this was a multi day museum. We saw what we could before it closed at 5 pm. We never did get out side or to the presidential aircraft. We'll have to go back next year. We also learned that there was a Packard Museum and some other museums that we would like to visit. Also we discussed, the possibility of spending more days for the trip to see more museums and places of interest.

Since we were tired, weary and hungry we decided it was time to eat. Last year, Jim had found a nice restaurant near his hotel. We ate there. The food was delicious and we enjoyed our selves. We also had to sample the homemade ice cream. It was yummy. We were all amazed that Dave had room for his large dinner and then an enormous desert. He had a six-inch by six-inch piece of chocolate cake, covered with ice cream and chocolate sauce. We all took a bite, but he ate the rest himself. Where did he put it?

Back at the hotel, we compared notes, reviewed some of our purchases and made plans for the return trip home.

Dayton Hamvention de KB1FTX

This past weekend I had the privilege to go to the largest Ham Radio Flea Market/Show in the U.S. or maybe even the world. It was a playground for amateur radio. It was like none other, 25 thousand people, every radio you could imagine (and, for me, a dad with money). If you can think of it -- they had it there. Not only were there people selling junk, but also there were people selling stuff you might actually need! As I stepped in to the arena it was so overwhelming that I did not know where to start. I just started to walk, not knowing where I was going, nor what I was supposed to do... I just wandered. I figured we would be there for 4 days and even though you can't see it all, it is worth a try. Nothing was marked with arrows or signs and after a while it got repetitive. You would think that something was one way, but it was really the other. The best way to tell where I needed to go was the room with the wooden floor. This was one of the last rooms I saw on the first day, but from there the inside was getting clearer. Then we went outside -- again every thing was a blur.
