

YAESU MH-31 ELECTRET ELEMENT CONVERSION

I have an old Yaesu FT-900 that has a MH-31 hand microphone (mic). I could key the transmitter but had no audio. The mic has a dynamic element which I assumed went bad. I browsed the internet and found an excellent article by M0UKD on replacing the dynamic element with an electret element. Electret elements can be found in cell phones, mp3 recorders, cassette tape players... the list goes on. I don't throw electronics away, I strip them for parts. You can also purchase them from various parts vendors on the internet. Electret mics require +5V which it so happens, the MH-31 has in the head of the mic.




This picture is that of the M0UKD circuit diagram.



On this second picture, you can see the MH-31 after the electret element was installed.

It was easy because the original dynamic element is about 5 times larger. To the right is my next project which is inserting an electret element into some pvc piping that I had laying around. This will make a nice boom mic. I drilled a hole in one of the caps and inserted a piece of screening. In both cases, to keep the element in place, I used some hot glue. In the case of the pvc pipe mic, I will have to supply +5v from either the source or an external power supply.

This third picture is a close-up of the electret element inside the MH-31 mic and shows where the +5V connection is located. I saved myself about a Ulysses S. Grant on this project. The boom mic is a bonus since I had all the parts hanging around. Another plus is that the electret element has more audio gain than the stock dynamic element.

AN EL CHEAPO ANTENNA LAUNCHER

GENT LAM WA1CQF

Antenna season is rapidly approaching. By tradition this kind of activity is usually done in the rain, in 30 degree weather, or with 3 inches of snow on the ground. Presently I only have a 40 meter dipole for wire antennas. A few years ago, a big snowstorm in October knocked it to the ground and turned by tri-bander into a 1-1/2 element beam. NO.....I did not immediately go out and repair the antennas.

Over the winter I pondered the various methods I could use to get a line over a tree to bring the 40 meter dipole back to life. Sling shots, bow and arrow, and pneumatic potato cannons were considered. The amount of times that I would need an antenna erecting device is minimal. I just want to get the dipole back into the tree. It would be cool to build a potato cannon. They look neat and fun to build. However, it would spend most of its life on a shelf in the garage. It requires compressed air for use. Fortunately I have a small compressor in the garage.

When push came to shove, I decided on the same method that I used to originally install the dipole. A 8" adjustable wrench tied to a string was tossed through the tree. However, the last time I did that the wrench got caught up in the limbs. The thought of losing one of my favorite wrenches did not sit well. it was a true "Crescent" wrench—not one of the throwaway wrenches sold by Harbor Freight. It took a some tense minutes and a few choice words to return the coveted tool back to terra firma.

This time, instead of the wrench, I used a small plastic soda bottle. After consuming the contents, the bottle was filled with tap water. A string was tied around the neck of the bottle. Fluorescent string sold in hardware stores is suitable and easy to see. Depending on whether I had Wheaties for breakfast, the phase of the moon, and my throwing style, I can toss the bottle 35-40 ft high. Once the string is pulled through the tree and the antenna erected, the bottle can be emptied and recycled.

This project encompasses multiple uses of a container which is recyclable. Overall cost is minimal (CHEAP!!!!), and you can say you did it yourself.

HCRA's raffle this year is for a Kenwood TS-590SG!

Even though I've been involved in amateur radio for about 20 years, I still consider myself a greenhorn when it comes to our club. There are members that have been active in this club for decades. They have been HCRA members much longer than I've been alive. Even though I am trying to focus on the future, I feel that I should also look into the history of our club and see how it has progressed throughout the years. Use the past to help look into the future.

Thanks to the efforts of John Balboni (AC1T) and John Pise (KX1X), we were able to digitize and share previous issues of Zero Beat as far back as 1976. These issues showed a lot of history of our club and what amateur radio was like back then. I've learned a lot by reading previous Zero Beats but I know our club is much older than that. I would like to share as much history as possible and showcase those who helped HCRA throughout the years and decades.

I was almost certain that we would not see anything earlier than 1976. People moved on and shacks were cleaned out. To some, it was just a pile of papers but to me, it was more. I wanted more knowing that it was out there... somewhere.

Just a week or two ago, Juergen Malner (NVIQ) reached out to David Isham (KB1MU) and asked for any HCRA history that he may have. Thankfully Dave presented Juergen with a crate full of wonderful memories. I was excited to hear about this potential treasure trove of history and couldn't wait to get my hands on it

Dave had archives of Zero Beat going back to the late 1940s. He did a wonderful job cataloging and preserving our club history. He even digitized most of the archives which must have been very time consuming and labor intensive. There were also some other items in the archive like the prepared statement for the fire that happened during the 1954 Field Day at Porter Tower in Wilbraham. Also included were 35mm Slides of the fire that I'm in the process of digitizing for all to see. A big thanks to David Isham (KB1MU) for his work and effort.

We are currently combing and uploading the archives to our website. If you take a look at our Zero Beat archives that are available on our website, you will see some of the publications from the late 1940s and 50s. More will be added as time goes on and eventually everything that can be digitized will be available for all to see. Check back periodically for updates to the archives.

I would strongly suggest that you go back in time and read what it was like to be an amateur radio operator in Hampden County in the 40s and 50s. You will be able to experience how things were much different. What's even more interesting are the similarities of the past and present. Some things just don't change, even after 65 years.



THE AMATEUR RADIO PARITY ACT OF 2015: S-1685/HR-1301

The ARRL has announced that they expect the US House Bill HR-1301 will have 100 co-sponsors when congress returns after it's summer break. Currently there is only 1 Congressman from Massachusetts, District #2 James McGovern. District #1 (Where most of the HCRA resides.) Richard Neil has yet to sign on.
