FIELD DAY 2016: A GREAT WEEKEND!

In late June of 2016, HCRA returned to School Street Park in Agawam MA to participate in field day sponsored by the ARRL. Field day is considered to be the amateur radio related event of the year here in the US with up to 30,000 people participating with portable setups, at EOC's, club stations and even from their home. It's an excellent exercise in emergency communications as well a great social event for fellow amateurs and a way to promote the hobby to the general public.

This would be our 4th year at School Street Park. The town of Agawam and their Parks and Rec department have been making continuous improvements to the park which HCRA benefits from. The town of Agawam has been nothing but supportive of our club and efforts.

We planned for 6 station setup. This would put HCRA into a different category with less entries and it gives more people a chance to operate. With our 4 military style antenna towers, multi-band beams, wire antennas, triplexers and filters, we have no issue with 6 stations. In years past years at school street, we've worked out the issues with interstation interference by placing stations near or in between the towers they will be using.

A Field day wouldn't be right if we didn't try something new. This year we wanted to include Springfield Emergency Preparedness into the communications side of the event. We wanted to give 6 meter a try since it's been very promising.

Since we had access to the bandshell, We thought it would be nice to bring back food to Field Day. In years past we've decided not to go with a cookout because of the amount of near-by restaurants, no place to really gather around and the lack of volunteers. This year Allan Dove (AB1XW) volunteered to handle the grill.

A couple weeks before Field Day, Harold (N1FTP), Bob (K1YO), Larry (W1AST) and myself met up at the club trailer. We took everything out, organized containers, made sure antennas were in together and prepped it. We are now ready for field day. On Friday (June 24th, 2016), many HCRA members met up at the park and once the sprinkler heads/pipe were located, we went to work putting up towers and antennas. We've had some issues with placing the antennas on the towers. HCRA ended up purchasing a step ladder to help make things easier. The day was hot but we've had plenty of water on hand and the pizza was good. We've managed to get all the towers erected with antennas mounted in preparation for raising them on Saturday. We've had at least a dozen park goers stop by and asked what's going on. We stopped around 5pm. Some HCRA members stayed the night to watch over the equipment. We also had some fun and managed to make many DX contacts with the beam just 15 or so feet off the ground.



On Saturday we resumed setup. We raised the towers and the captains were getting their stations setup. Final SWR checks were done and we were ready for Field Day. Of course there were some issues along the way. What isn't a field day without some. A lot of it had to do with N1MM+ and the networking. However it was figured out and all the stations were talking to each other. 2PM was upon us and we started calling CQ right away. Instead of the rain like we had last year, this year we were battling the heat. Since school street is a new(er) park, shade is considered a luxury but we made due with the situation.

At around 4pm, Jim (KK1W) and Frandy (N1FJ) did a presentation on choosing and setting up a portable station. It attracted a decent amount of people and they did really well showing the many options available. It's certain that people left knowing a lot more about what goes into portable operating.

Following the presentation, HCRA conducted a VE exam for anyone willing to take a test at field day. Following the exam, Allan (AB1XW) was well on his way cooking burgers and dogs. He did an excellent job and everyone was fed... except for Jim (KK1W). A big thanks to Larry (W1AST) and Faye Krainson and George Zimmerman (KC1CXD) for providing extra snacks and food that lasted throughout the weekend.

Operations went throughout the night well into the morning. However the heat got to us and we were un-able to operate throughout the night. Operations appeared to start again around 7am with a run to Dunkin Donuts for the much needed coffee. Faye helped out by making everyone pancakes. We continued to operate until the very end.

Packing up proved to be quite difficult. There wasn't the amount of volunteers like we had in years past for tear down so it took much longer to pack up. We also had great difficulty with some screw anchors on the 40m SSB tower. The dry clay embedded dirt created a "pocket" that didn't allow us to easily unscrew the anchors. Combined with the heat, it made for an exhausting afternoon. We didn't leave the park until 4:30pm.

Overall Field Day was a success. Many people stopped by and we even managed to get on the WWLP TV 22 newscast. <http://wwlp.com/2016/06/26/ham-radio-operators-technology-before-the-digital-revolution/>

Excellent promotion for both HCRA and Amateur Radio. However it wasn't perfect. The heat was of course an issue and there was also many "little" things that happened that need to be addressed if HCRA is going to have a Field Day in 2017. We need more volunteers for both setup and tear down. We need more people dedicated for the entire event. We need a crew made up of multiple people that know the ins and outs of the towers and/or antennas. We also need a co-chair that knows exactly what goes where and could make decisions when they are needed. We need you!

HCRA members and guests ended up making approximately 2,822 contacts. 1058 CW contacts, 1743 SSB contacts and 21 digital contacts. We also made 1790 bonus points. HCRA is claiming 9592 points for 2016. That is 382 less than last year. A combination of heat, band conditions and not as many operators as years past had a role to play but the whole point of Field Day is to have fun. I hope that everyone that attended and volunteered had good time. It's not easy but I think it's worth it if we had fun.

MY DAYTON 2016 TRIP

I have a friend that can decide to go someplace a few days before and then he makes his plans. I can't do that. I'm a planner and planning works for me in work, life, radio, scouting, everything. There's not much I do last minute. So, with that in mind, sometime in May of 2015, I started thinking about attending Dayton again in May of 2016. But that depended on a few things, like getting my son a car, so I didn't have to shuttle him between home, job and college in Brockport, NY which was usually on Dayton weekend.

I mentioned going to a few close friends as something to think about. Then started helping my son find a car, which we did in early July 2015. Things were good and my taxi dad days were over (or so I thought, more on that later).

Fast forward to October where NT1K, NF1G, KC1BDL and myself went to Nearfest in NH. I had already tossed the idea of Dayton to Chris (KC1BDL) and JJ (KC2FEV) and they were in. On the trip to and from NH, I brought up the subject to Paul, NF1G and he was hooked having never been. Also, George KC1V and I were chatting about it and he mentioned his friend Mike in Kansas (forgot his call). That made us a group of 6.

Fast forward again to late January to late February. JJ was taking care of the hotel as he got some good discounts and prices. My request was no smoking mandatory and a hot tub to soak in at the end of each day. He delivered on all counts.

May arrived and the excitement started to build especially since both Paul and I had good sized shopping lists as did JJ and Chris. What to drive was a topic for a while and we ended up with Pauls wifes Lexus RX350 suv. It was perfect, lots of room, very comfortable, lots of power and decent fuel economy. Except when packed with 4 guys bags, cooler and stuff, suddenly there wasn't lots of room. But we made due.

The plans were to leave on Thursday morning, May 19th and return Monday, May 23rd. George was flying out, Mike was driving in from Kansas. As luck would have it, the night of the 18th, my son called and said he was in a car accident. He walked away safely, the car is totaled, please come and get me in Greenfield, I want to come home. This was 9:30 pm and I needed to get up at 4:30 am to get to Chris' for 6 am. I did my fatherly duties, got back home before midnight and stayed awake all night. I was not a driver the next day.

6 am came on the 19th. We left Chicopee headed towards Syracuse where we picked up JJ. That leg was 230 miles. Then the remaining 530 or so towards Dayton. We were blessed with good weather for the drive and the sun rising behind us, so it wasn't in our eyes. It was a 12 hour drive, but great company and a comfortable ride made the time go and before we knew it, we were 4 hours out. That's when the phone rang.

Mike and George were at the hotel. JJ had booked 3 rooms, next to one another with 2 beds in each room. But, that's not what Mike and George were given or what the hotel had actually booked for us. They had one bed rooms. Very unacceptable for all of us. JJ got on the phone and started with the hotel and worked his way to upper management. Around 6:30 pm we pulled into the hotel, checked in, then went out for dinner. We caught up with Mike and George and all planned 9am to head to the hamvention, right after breakfast the next morning.

We got lucky and found 3 day parking right behind the Hara Arena. That meant no bus ride to and from parking, no long walks and anything purchased could be brought to the car immediately, so we didn't have to walk around with it! It worked great and we did park there all 3 days! A great \$20 investment!

If you haven't been to Dayton, it's like a hundred Boxboro's and Nearfests combined. Inside vendors were in different rooms. I believe this year they had over 500 inside vendors. Outside were hundreds of flea market purveyors. It was like a never ending

flea market with not only used stuff (I saw that at Nearfest, right?) but some new vendors too. Lots and lots and lots of stuff. Lots of walking. My activity tracker said I did over 13 miles the first day!

I wasn't too impressed with the flea market and hung around inside trying to find everything I wanted for my shopping list which included a new 6 band HF beam, rotor and controller, battery for portable operation, 100 feet of coax & rotor cable, a thrust bearing, smaller power supply for my KX3 and a few other smaller things. Paul was looking for a new HF amp, JJ tuner, and more, Chris a headset for his TS-590 and maybe more. A larger shopping list than we had room for in the vehicle for the ride home.

Our plans were to stay somewhat together since cell service was horrible in and around the arena. Texting just didn't work either and way too much RF for HT's. But we did get split up and eventually found each other again.

I used Friday as a talk to vendors day for beams. I had my comparison chart and a list of questions as did the other guys with their shopping lists too. I also had an interesting conversation with a vendor.

I was at the Pro Audio Engineering booth and had a question on the KX3 power supply he sells. I was wearing my HCRA log shirt and mid way thru his answering my questions, he looks at my shirt, points to the logo and said "I was a member of that club in the early 70's". That comment side tracked our power supply conversation and started a new one. I listed off hams I knew were around back then and he knew all of them. The I asked where he lived and he said Longmeadow! Now the world was getting real small and conversation to ham radio at Longmeadow High School, common people we knew. Then I noticed his last name and we figured out I went to school with his brother Chris and still chat with Chris on FaceBook. Sometimes the world is a very small place. His name was Howie Hoyt from Pro Audio Engineering and he is from the triangle of NC, which is the Raleigh area.

We finally regrouped and went back to the hotel for the day. Upon returning to our room, JJ and I found that the maid had never been there and had hung the no maid service on our door. We didn't care about the beds but did want fresh towels at least. A trip to the front desk and a conversation with a nasty manager (JJ had this duty) and finally we had fresh towels. Out to dinner we went and discussed the days events and our finds. Upon returning to the hotel, we converged at the hot tub for a very nice and well deserved soak.

Saturday we were up and ready and repeated Friday morning with breakfast and out the door for 9 am. Back to the same parking area and back to the Hara Arena. By mid day I finally decided on a new antenna and went with JK Antennas Navassa-5 plus the 6m add-on kit. That made it 12 elements and lots of aluminum. Since the beam cost me less than I planned originally, I splurged on a Green Heron rotor controller and Yaesu G-1000 rotor combo package (well spent). Two things down and in budget. A trip to HRO and coax, rotor cable and thrust bearing ordered which would arrive on Monday, before I did back home. Everything of mine was shipped. I also picked up a Uniden scanner and some little stuff such as a 2nd LNR Precision 10/20/40 end fed antenna. While I was making my purchases, the other guys were too. Paul bought a Acom amp, Chris a Heil headset, JJ a MFJ tuner. Pauls amp got shipped, the other guys had their purchases with them. They barely fit into the car! My activity tracker said I did 8 miles on Saturday!

I did bump into a few other HCRA members such as Bob; NQ1C and Steve; N1EOE during the Hamvention. I saw a few others I recognized from the Hartford-Springfield area too.



While at Dayton we also saw releases of some new equipment or pre-announcements of new equipment such as the Icom IC-7300, new Kenwood HT (not yet released), some ginourmous towers by Luso, the Elecraft KX2 and some others too. Kenwood, Icom and Yaesu had big displays as did many other vendors. All had some very cool stuff. Some of which are only dreamed about!



Sunday came and out the door we went back to Dayton for the last hours of the show. JJ picked up a scanner like mine, a few other incidentals were picked up. Since Paul and Chris were there for the first time, we went to The National Museum of the United States Air Force, at Wright-Patterson Airforce Base, and walked around there. It's an awesome museum. Even

We're currently past the halfway point and there is room for people to advance.

When writing this Article (Aug 26th, 2016), Chris Scibelli (NU1O) is the current board leader in both overall unique DXCC contacts and band slots (Unique DXCC contacts per band). 
